

Supplementary Table 1. CDC classification system for HIV infected adults and adolescents (CDC, 1992)

| Clinical category | Conditions |
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| A | Asymptomatic: acute HIV or persistent generalized lymphadenopathy |
| B | <p>Conditions that are attributed to HIV infection or indicate a defect in cell-mediated immunity</p> <p>Conditions that are considered to have a clinical course or management that is complicated by HIV infection.</p> <p>Examples include, but are not limited to, the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Bacillary angiomatosis - Oropharyngeal candidiasis (thrush) - Vulvovaginal candidiasis, persistent or resistant - Pelvic inflammatory disease - Cervical dysplasia (moderate or severe)/cervical carcinoma <i>in situ</i> <p>Hairy leukoplakia, oral</p> <p>Herpes zoster (shingles), involving two or more episodes or at least one dermatome</p> <p>Idiopathic thrombocytopenic purpura</p> <p>Constitutional symptoms, such as fever (>38.5°C) or diarrhea lasting >1 month</p> <p>Peripheral neuropathy</p> |
| C | <p>Bacterial pneumonia, recurrent (two or more episodes in 12 months)</p> <p>Candidiasis of the bronchi, trachea, or lungs</p> <p>Candidiasis, esophageal</p> <p>Cervical carcinoma, invasive, confirmed by biopsy</p> <p>Coccidioidomycosis, disseminated or extrapulmonary</p> <p>Cryptococcosis, extrapulmonary</p> <p>Cryptosporidiosis, chronic intestinal (>1 month in duration)</p> <p>Cytomegalovirus disease (other than liver, spleen, or nodes)</p> <p>Encephalopathy, HIV-related</p> <p>Herpes simplex: chronic ulcers (>1 month in duration), or bronchitis, pneumonitis, or esophagitis</p> <p>Histoplasmosis, disseminated or extrapulmonary</p> <p>Isosporiosis, chronic intestinal (>1-month in duration)</p> <p>Kaposi sarcoma</p> <p>Lymphoma, Burkitt, immunoblastic, or primary central nervous system</p> <p>Mycobacterium avium complex or mycobacterium kansasii, disseminated or extrapulmonary</p> <p>Mycobacterium tuberculosis, pulmonary or extrapulmonary</p> <p>Mycobacterium, other species or unidentified species, disseminated or extrapulmonary</p> <p>Pneumocystis jiroveci (formerly carinii) pneumonia</p> <p>Progressive multifocal leukoencephalopathy</p> <p>Salmonella septicemia, recurrent (nontyphoid)</p> <p>Toxoplasmosis of brain</p> <p>Wasting syndrome caused by HIV (involuntary weight loss >10% of baseline body weight) associated with either chronic diarrhea (two or more loose stools per day for ≥ 1 month) or chronic weakness and documented fever for ≥ 1 month</p> |
